The Ballard Golden Beavers Scholarships Committee by Dolores (Finseth) Moore '48, Scholarship Chairman

This committee is formed in January of each year. A person is chosen by giving their name to the committee chairman, or their name has been suggested by another Ballard Golden Beaver to serve on this committee. This year we have 7 people on the interview team.

Prior to the interview, we have been given 20 to 25 students folders out of a possible 80 applicants selected by a Ballard H.S. Committee to take home and read, make notes, and write down questions to ask. This gives us some information on the student before we interview them. We

interview every 15 minutes starting at 8:00 A.M. and ending around 2:30 P.M. Then it becomes voting time. This is a very difficult, interesting, and rewarding day. It gives us a feeling of what wonderful students will be following us in this world. All these students are deserving of our scholarships, and there are some hard decisions to be made. Sometimes after discussion we take two, maybe three, votes to be sure we are on the same page. We never leave the building, but we do receive a break morning and afternoon, and also a much needed lunch break.





two years, and All- American one year in Basketball. Steve went on to the University of Washington where he participated on varsity level Basketball for three years, was selected as team captain, and honored as an all coast selection. One of his teammates at both Ballard and the UW Richard (Dick) Lee '61 had this to say about his friend Steve. "As a friend, I remember him most for the countless hours he spent showing and teaching me the needed basketball skills on the asphalt pavement at the old James Monroe Junior High School." Dick goes on to say, "As a teammate Steve set the way for one of the most successful periods in Ballard Beaver Basketball history. Not only was he a great player, but he was a great leader and the consummate team player."

Steve went on to graduate from the U W with a BA in 1964, and he graduated from Seattle University with a Master of Education Degree in 1971. He received his Superintendent Certificate from the UW in 1987.

During his 42 years as an Educator he has served as a Teacher, Registrar, Vice Principal, Principal at several schools and as a Superintendent. His last job was with the Seattle School District where he was the Chief Academic Officer for nearly three years.

Victor Salvino '51 prominent businessman and philanthropist said of Steve,"Forty two years as an educator at his level is impressive." Salvino went on to say "Steve has been very active in many ways for the betterment of academics in the Puget Sound region."

Former Roosevelt and Ballard High School Principal Charles (Chuck) Chinn known as "Head Beaver while at BHS has this to say about Steve. "I have always thought of Steve Wilson as being one of the finest home grown educational leaders in the Seattle School District. He has always impressed me as



being an educator with exceptional integrity, experiential knowledge, fair mindedness, and a great sense of humor, who exercised a confident, supportive, common sense approach in his leadership style. During the period of time when he served as the principal of Ingraham High School, the school gained national prominence as one of the best high schools in the United States. Facts: The number of scholarships given is determined by our treasurer and the executive board based on monies received that year. This is then submitted to the membership for a vote. Ballard Golden Beavers started giving two scholarships in the late 1980's, and over the years it was increased to twelve. The membership voted to increase the scholarship amounts from \$2000.00 to \$3000.00 about six years ago. We also have scholarships that have been given in the past by individuals, or memorial's by families in someone name. At present we have three self-directed scholarships. Do to the economic crisis these past few years, and interest decline in our accounts, the number of scholarships has been decreased. This year we will be giving four (4) four-year scholarships and four (4) twoyear scholarships for a total value amount of \$24.000.00.

Your membership in the Ballard Golden Beavers is important. Your kindness in giving and funding these scholarships also is important. Thank you for all you have done for Ballard graduates over the years.

By Laws

- 1. Scholarship funds shall be kept in separate interest bearing accounts.
- 2. Payment on scholarships shall be made directly to the institution selected by each scholarship recipient. However, if the institution is not able to receive such funds directly for scholarship, the Association shall provide a proper safeguard so that funds will be used as intended.
 - 3. Non-discrimination policy:
- a. The Association shall not discriminate by race or religion as to membership in the Association or as to selection of student recipients of the scholarship funds or as to any other matter.
- b. The Association shall at all times issue scholarships or loans of any kind only to students attending a non-segregated public or private college, university or technical institute.
- c. The Association shall prepare and establish several categories of scholarships to students who need financial aid without any discrimination.
- 4. No member of the immediate family of Scholarship Committee members shall be eligible for selection for receipt of scholarship



We funded a first class sound system for the Earl Kelly Auditorium in the amount of \$130,000 along with the cooperation of the Ballard PTSA and the BHS Music Department. Seventeen students have 'graduated' out of the program and are now in the main stream of education and are thriving. At the beginning of this next semester more students will be added to the program. Studies indicate that our goals continue on the line that they will be met. We will not know until 2015-2016 school year if we have met all of our goals, but it appears that we are on track. Thank you to all of you that have supported me during my tenure. I hope you continue to support the Foundation in any way you can.





Life in a Small Town: Republic, WA by Gloria Mae Crowley Butler '56

i All, I have been given the pleasure of bringing you all up to date about where I live and what I have been doing since I left Seattle. I came to Republic WA. January 11 1957 the day after my birthday. The evening I stepped off that bus was one of the coldest I have ever known! The temperature was 52 below zero and I had never seen so much snow only in pictures! I came to visit some family and had only planned to stay maybe at the most 2 weeks. It took another hour and a half to actually get to Republic as bus service did not go that far. When we arrived at Republic I noticed how small the house was and I did not see a sink in the kitchen. Hum, thought that was strange but oh well. When I asked where the bathroom was I was told "outside". OMG! I thought outhouses went out in the horse and buggy days. After I finally got it that they were not kidding they gave me a flashlight and pointed out where I was to go. Fancy, it was a 2 hole one! Oh well, only going to be here for 2 weeks, maybe even less now. When I asked where I could wash up for bed they went into the kitchen took some water out of a reservoir connected to a big wood cook stove. I had never seen anything like that before either. The next morning I went to use the "facilities" and that cold air when I took that first breath dropped me to the ground. I fainted! Just about scared everybody to death including myself. Trust me this was all totally new to this city girl!

I was taken to town to see the sights, do some shopping and my family wanted to introduce me to their friends. I walked from one end of Republic to the other and it took me less than 10 minutes! There were three Grocery stores, of which we only have one still operating at this time. There were 3 taverns and one hotel/cocktail lounge, one bank, a drug store, two small clothing stores, two restaurants and a small post office. Republic

also had 3 churches. Today we have one grocery store which is family owned from the beginning of the 1900's, also the same with our drug store. We have grown some from when I first arrived. At this time we have a new library and hospital and a few years ago a new school. After looking this quaint little town over I asked if there was bus service to take me to another town to shop, maybe like Spokane. I was told that there was a stage that I could catch around 8:30 in the morning! Now, as I said before, I am a city girl and I was totally imagining a horse drawn stage and all of a sudden I said to myself, "self, where are you and what have you gotten yourself into this time"? It was then explained to me the "stage" was a large van that picked up mail and passengers to take out of town, not to Spokane though, just as far as Colville, sixty miles away, but quit a bit bigger than Republic.

I'll try to explain a bit of Republic to you as it grows on you after you have been here awhile in a good way. Republic is the county seat of Ferry County. Population may be a little under 1000, but the total population of the whole county is approximately 7,260. The climate averages anywhere from 40 below to 110. But that is not the norm all the time. Unfortunately it does not last long in the summer and it only gives us about 100 days of good growing season for farmers and gardeners. Another unique thing about Republic is we do not have a stop light! Stop signs, yes, but no light until you get to the Canadian border which is only about 40 miles away. We have many roads that say primitive, or not maintained. That might bother a city person but for those here all the time, it's really no big deal. The road leading to my house which is down by the lake is a primitive road. Means not paved to those who don't

Speaking of Canada, it has some spectacular ski hills. Yes mom, I learned to ski and I did not fall and kill myself! How I envied the Ski Club at Ballard High. I did make up for lost time once I learned how to use those sticks! We even started the kids skiing at 2 years old. Ben skied all his life and if he had anything to say about it, his wife and kids was too! Ben was also a ski instructor and taught just about every kid that ever skied in Republic how to shoosh down those kills! What fun we had! He even taught the grandkids! Sadly the great grandkids live too far away now.

Mountains surround Republic. Sherman Pass, the highest pass in the State of Washington that is plowed and kept open all winter long, has an elevation of 5,575feet. There is a beautiful viewing site at the top of the pass that is spectacular.

Republic also has several nice lakes but the main one is called Curlew Lake. This is the one my husband Ben and I live by. He bought the property when he was a senior in high school and on week-ends worked at preparing the property to build a house on. Also on Curlew Lake we have a really nice air port that can accommodate large big fixed wing planes. We have an annual big Fly In every year and it has grown guit large and we always get good comments on our air port. I have to stick a little bit of praise in here as my husband; Ben did all the surveying for that airport. There were times I along with the kids would go along and help. Last but not least there are several nice resorts around the lake, which also is the place our annual 4th of July fireworks are shown.

Republic used to have 2 active working gold mines, but is now down to one. It's called Kinross Mine, and there are rumors of it closing in another year or so. When Ben retired from the County Engineers Dept of the

Orville Anderson '44: Veteran and Entrepreneur

rville Anderson moved to Ballard from Leith, North Dakota when he was 12 years old and has never left. He grew up on a farm in Leith and was the youngest of seven children. Orville and his late wife Marion (Hazard, B.H.S. class of 1948) built their home in the North Beach area in 1951, and he still resides there today. His three children, Susan, Sharon, and David all live in the Seattle area, along with his six grandchildren, and one great granddaughter. Susan graduated from Ballard High in 1970, and David in 1983. Sharon graduated from Ingraham High School in 1979.

Growing up, Orville attended Ballard First Lutheran Church, and joined Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church in 1950. Orville and Marion were married at Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church August 19, 1950. He still attends church every Sunday at Our Redeemer's, and brings his famous egg salad sandwiches for all to share.

Orville is a lifetime member of The Ballard Elks, and regularly can be found playing poker there on Monday evenings. His wood working hobbies include building bird houses, model lighthouses, and "wagon wheels". Any donations he receives for these items are donated to The Ballard Elks, as well as other charitable organizations in the Ballard area.

After working at Stanley Doors in Kent, Washington he and Marion opened Anderson's Door Company in February of 1977 and the company is still in operation today, and managed by their family. Orville was in the garage door industry for more than 50 years before retiring.

Orville has always been an avid sports fan over the years. He enjoys watching the Seahawks, Mariners and his grandchildren playing softball, baseball, football, basketball and hockey.

Orville turned 88 on March 7th of this year. During his 88 years he has traveled the world. Cruises to South America, The Panama Canal and Alaska and trips to Mexico, Cuba, France, Norway, Hawaii, Malta, Italy, Africa, France, England, Scotland, Switzerland, Germany and Cooperstown, New York.

county he was hired to be there underground surveyor. This kept him out of trouble for another 14 years.

As for myself, I did many things over the years to help bring in more income for our growing family. I did school bus driving for 5 years which was a trip! Haha I worked in the Lounge for awhile even thought teaching might be the way to go. Finally I decided to do what I had always wanted to do in the first place and went back to school to do just that. Get into the nursing field. So for the next few years until I became old enough to retire, I worked at Ferry County Memorial Hospital. I also became an EMT. I so enjoyed it and knew I had found my nitch. In the summer Ben and I take anywhere from six to eight weeks and go dredging in the river at Orville that flows down from Canada. We pack up the camper, the dog, the gold pans, food stuff, Cabana we invested in to set up by the camper as it gets mighty warm over there! Ben runs the dredge and I pan out his findings. We have a blast! Do we get rich and sell lots of gold? No and no. We are getting a nice collection of some nice pieces plus lots and lots of flakes. Its good exercise, fun to do and we're out in the good healthy air. What could be better? Oh yes, I know, that nice cold corona when we get back to camp after a long hot day and we can talk and laugh while we discuss our findings for the day! I feel sorry for wives who say they can't stand there husband under foot all the time after retirement! Isn't that what you wanted to do when you got married? Be together.

Yup, I'm still here, as I said it kind of grows on you and it didn't hurt that I met this tall dark drop dead gorgeous guy by the name of Ben Butler, who became the love of my life. We had six beautiful children, three boys and three girls. Then the grandkids came along. At last count we have thirteen grandchildren and fifteen great grandchildren. I have been truly blessed! I got Ben a hat one year for his birthday that said, "If I Had Known Grandkids Were This Much Fun, I Would of Had Them Sooner". He loves those kids and some of

the girls still has him wrapped around there fingers. When my daughter and son-in law who were both in service were stationed in Germany we went to visit them as she had her second baby within 14 months and I told Ben it was time momma went over to help out. Ben was stationed in Germany also during the Cold War. He agreed as he wanted to show me around Germany. What a trip! Germany is a beautiful country! While there we borrowed one of the kid's cars and also went to France, Austria, Belgium, and then into London both coming and going. Oh, and let me tell you the Follies Berge in Lost Vegas is nothing! Wait until you see them in France! The whole trip was very memorable as it was the year the Berlin Wall came down. While we were there my son in law was on stand by to go to the Persian Gulf.

So all and all living in a rural area has it plus and minus's but I would not trade it for anything! Yes, me the city girl, who knew this was only going to be for two weeks! These are some of the nicest, friendliest people who would never think twice about going that extra mile for a neighbor no matter what. We had a house fire in the late 70's, in wh we lost everything. Neighbors and all the churches were there immediately, offering what ever we might need. The help for me and my family was one of the most awesome things I have ever had the honor to witness. Money, food, clothing from the stores, etc. This is what they do for everyone! Need help with your hay in the summer, your neighbor or neighbor kid is there to help, out of work, layed off short of money they hold a benefit at the Eagles Lodge. They have even been known to send money anonymously! We are neighbors and friends helping each other. In Republic someone you don't know is a friend you haven't met yet! The disaster we had last July 20th knocked out almost 75% of the power lines and trees down, made many roads impassable for many days. The outside Federal people came to help and soon found they weren't really needed as everybody, neighbor

helping neighbor, were already out with ax's, chain saws anything that would open roads or help another in some way was already being done! We even had food station bases set up for those who needed it. The Search and Rescue team made a survey of going door to door to see if people were ok or needed help in anyway. If ok white papers were taped to door to let anybody behind you know that house was secure and ok. I was privileged to be part of that group.

Living in this rural County is not the same as it was the 1950's. Part of the reason for that is the fact that Eastern Wash. is the redheaded step child of the state and is controlled by laws that are good for the West side but not necessarily good for the East side of the state, especially the small rural areas. Some of these laws can and did hurt small communities like ours. The south end of Ferry County is part of the Colville Indian Reservation and about 85% of the North half is the mismanaged National Forest. We live in an area that is a bountiful area with wild game, lakes, rivers and streams filled with fish. In the 50's the game regulations were a one page document, now it is a book and you almost need a lawyer to read it. The main source of work outside of government employment has been in the mining and logging industry. Logging has almost disappeared but for awhile we still have some mining. Washington State is listed as the worst state in the nation to get a permit to mine. It now takes over 10 years to get a mining permit. Ferry County has been the largest gold producer in the whole state. We help each other when ever there is a need in any way we can. That's what Republic does. Why? Because we are not only neighbors we are all friends and you never know when someone might need you, but if you do, someone is always there to help. Why do I stay in Republic with less than half the amenities of the city...this is my home, has been now for over 50 years and the people here are now family. I am blessed to have these good friends and neighbors. There is always a welcome mat out for visitors, so, ya all come now, ya hear?
