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A Message From the Principal

fter almost 18 months of fully or partially Aremote instruction, we started school on September 1 by welcoming more than 1,600 students back to the halls of Ballard High School. It has been so gratifying to see the happiness and joy for so many of our students, as they returned to a vital piece of normalcy in their lives. We haven't been able to hold school assemblies or dances and everyone has to wear masks, but the overall vibe is truly exhilarating. That being said, we are dealing daily with the reality that everyone has been living through a worldwide pandemic since March of 2020. Students and staff are having to re-acclimate to academic deadlines, homework, behavior expectations and the challenging realities of navigating almost 2,000 people on a daily basis. Much like Covid has held on much longer than we all hoped, the impacts of Covid and the lockdowns are going to linger for years to come.

This has been a time of great innovation and one of the areas where we have worked to increase access has been through the use of video recordings and live streaming. For two years now, we have not been able to host in-person Curriculum Nights for parents to meet teachers, so we have moved the event entirely online. The teachers each recorded 2-3 videos introducing themselves, sharing their grading policies and any other topics that they felt were valuable and I recorded some that applied to the entire school. There is not a replacement for getting to know someone in-person, but this has allowed us to continue to build familiarity and establish relationships while keeping everyone safe and not forcing them to pack into the school. Last Spring, we live streamed all of our athletic contests on the Ballard Athletics YouTube page and we are planning to live stream the Fall concerts in late October and early November on the Ballard Performing Arts YouTube page. This allows family members to tune in and watch



from anywhere in the world, which is pretty amazing.

When we were preparing to open school in August, Covid rates locally were at their 2nd highest rate since the pandemic began, so there was a lot of apprehension

about nearly 2,000 people in school at the same time. The first two weeks of school, the Seattle Public Schools dashboard showed Ballard having seven confirmed cases of Covid, but in the next two weeks we did not have any additional cases. We knew that it was inevitable that we would have some cases in our community, but the good news has been that we have not seen any evidence that it has spread at school. The high vaccination rates in our community, the mask requirement and the improvements to our ventilation system all seem like they have been paying off to keep us healthy. I am grateful to the leadership of our district and state for opening schools with scientifically based measures in place to allow us to be together in a safe manner.

There are times when being here feels precarious, but I know more than ever that we are having a significant impact on the students in our community. Every day at Ballard High School is a blessing for me and I try to share that belief with everyone here every day. It is truly always great to be a Beaver!

From 1988 to, and including, 2021, Ballard High School students received 374 Golden Beavers Scholarships for a total of \$790,307.

Moving from classes being online for seven and a half months to attending school for more than just three hours a day was an interesting move, mainly for cohorts A & B who now attend school in-person twice a week



"I'm really excited to be a sophomore... hopefully putting this behind us and starting fresh, and you know being able to learn again, that's all new, and we're all in person it's just easier for everyone," Rousseau said...

All-in-all, with the vast majority of senior year over, the class of 2021 seems to be looking more towards the future than trying to recreate the past.

"It's disappointing that we can't do all the fun stuff that we missed out on... so it's a mediocre senior year experience, which is acceptable, I guess," said Vangie Laufert which sums it up pretty perfectly.



Coach Rodney "Rod" Pressey '52

10/13/1933 to 5/12/2021

Rod Pressey was born in Ballard. He attended Adams, Monroe, and, in 1952, graduated from Ballard High, where he played basketball and baseball. He attended the University of Washington and lettered 3 years in baseball while receiving a degree in math and chemistry.

Rod returned to BHS in 1956 to teach math, and became an assistant basketball coach under Norm Goldstein until accepting the head coaching position in 67/68. He continued as head coach until 1974. Overall, as a coach, he participated in the State Tournament 12 times.

Coach Pressey was active in basketball throughout his teaching career, participating in summer basketball camps, clinics, and educational sports tours to Europe and Australia. He also served as Athletic Director and Activities Coordinator at Ballard. While at Ballard he was awarded a National Science Foundation Scholarship and received a Master's in Science Education in 1965 from the University of Pennsylvania.

After leaving BHS, Coach Pressey moved over to Inglemoor High School for 9 years and then opened up the new Woodinville High

School in 1983. Rod retired from education in 1987, after which he co-founded A Victorian County Christmas with his wife Lynda and ran it for the next 30 years.

Coach Pressey is survived by his children Bob and Karin from his first wife Laura (Paulson) and his wife Lynda and





Jack was very devoted to his friends. He and Carole hosted a Golden Beaver reunion at their Whidbey Island cabin in the summer for many years.


Jack is remembered lovingly by friends and family. He is most missed by his wife Carole,

G.A.I.N.S. Overview 2021-22

hank you for your support in creating a program that is helping many of our students navigate their way through high school! The GAINS program helps students stay on track academically from their 9th grade year through graduation, as GAINS Coordinators focus their time, energy and skill on building relationships with students in need of more individual support, encouragement and guidance both in terms of their academic growth and social emotional learning.

In 2020-2021 GAINS served:

- 86 Students (Soph-Sr.)
- 50 Male/35 Female/1 Gender Neutral
- 51 Students of Color/35 White
- · 24 Involved in School Athletics

As a program we have decided to add Freshman and New Students to our caseload based off Teacher recommendation instead of SPS system reports. We feel with so much of last school year being remote learning that the data would be skewed. However, we have been meeting with 9th graders that received an Incomplete during their 8th grade year. We are expecting to add roughly 40 freshman/new students to our caseload this school year.

We have also decided to expand the types of intervention we offer as a program. Most of our work is meeting with students 1 on 1 or in small groups. We will continue to do this, but we are wanting to expand to be more visible to the whole school. To accomplish this, we are out in the hallway before school and passing periods greeting students as they walk through the hallway. We will also provide "push in" services where we will join a class for a mini-lesson or to participate in class discussions or gallery walks. Our intent is to make potential GAINS students and some of our more self-conscious GAINS students feel that our services are not putting them in a negative spotlight, but instead we are a support system that is prevalent throughout the school.

CATB Funded Item: Seeking Equity with Music Lessons

Ballard Performing Arts strives to provide an inclusive, welcoming, and united community for all BHS students. Aligned with this is our strong belief that ALL students should be able to equally participate in all activities that the Ballard Performing Arts offers, regardless of their financial need.

One area that is painfully inequitable centers around one-on-one music lessons. Many of our students take focused lessons with a specialist concentrating on their instrument or voice part. The skills gained in these lessons are invaluable, and help with the student's technical ability, confidence, and overall musicianship. However, a significant family and financial commitment is needed for students to gain access to these one-on-one lessons. We want to make these lessons more equitable and accessible to all students.

Two thirds of our music students have taken such focused lessons at some point in their high school music career. However, 17% say that financial circumstances serve as a barrier in accessing lessons. We want to ensure there are no barriers to anyone and that everyone can benefit from one-on-one coaching!

What does it cost? \$50 will pay for one lesson. \$1,000 could help one student access instrument specific lessons twice a month for the entire school year. \$5,000 could help 5 students access lessons twice a month for the school year.

We asked the generous donors at CATB to help make these music lessons equitable for ALL Ballard Music students - and they responded to the tune of more than \$31,000!

The first Music Equity funds have already been disbursed and Courtney Rowley, PA

Department head along with other PA instructors have begun planning the strategy to ensure identified students will begin receiving support in

the very near future.

Update from Ballard Performing Arts: \$12,000 was granted to the program for this year, and the remainder will be granted next year. These are restricted funds and the band, orchestra, and choir directors will identify and approach music students they feel can benefit from this generous resource.

New SPS Websites Feature Northwest Coast Artwork

ave you seen the new Ballard High School website and noticed the beautiful background artwork?

As part of a redesign of all Seattle Public Schools websites, Tamanimas, a Northwest Coast design by Andrea Wilbur Sigo, Squaxin Island, is now visible in the theme artwork across SPS websites.

Andrea Wilbur Sigo is a traditional Native American Artist who is breaking barriers. She is a carver, which is unusual for women, and she has a computer sciences degree which she uses to synthesis her traditional designs into contemporary creations.


Growing up in a family of artists, Andrea's earliest memories are of creating art. She sold her first piece when she was eight years old and before long she was selling her pieces all over the world. Realizing how blessed she was to learn traditional arts at home, she is now sharing her knowledge and gifts with the youth in her community to ensure the techniques are not lost. She not only carves, but she also produces beadwork, weavings, button blankets, basket weaving, bentwood boxes,

paddles and creates beautiful two-dimensional designs. Andrea creates her own carving tools and creates her own natural dyes for the wool she uses for her weavings. She is a renowned carver whose latest project is the welcoming pole at the new housing at Chief Seattle Club in Pioneer Square which will be over twenty feet tall upon completion. The pole should be raised fall of 2021. She serves her tribe as a member of the Early Childhood Development Parent Board and is a board member of the Squaxin Island Tribal Museum.

Andrea is enrolled Squaxin Island, and a descendent of the Skokomish, Jamestown S'Klallam, Nisqually, Tulalip and Yakama tribes
