We Have Recently Lost...

Tom Alberg '58





Tom Alberg left this world on August 5, 2022.

Tom co-founded Madrona in 1995 and actively worked in support of Madrona and its portfolio companies. Tom served on the boards of numerous public and private companies, including Amazon.com, on which he started serving before it went public in 1997. He was a former director for Impinj, a prior Madrona Portfolio Company that is now a public company. Immediately prior to founding Madrona, Tom served as president of public companies LIN Broadcasting Corporation and executive vice president of McCaw Cellular Communications, Inc. Previously, he was chair of the executive committee and partner in the Northwest's largest law firm, Perkins Coie, where he was principal counsel for The Boeing Company, Alaska Airlines, and a number of early technology companies. Before that, he was an attorney with Cravath, Swaine & Moore in New York.

He was past chair of the Washington State Technology Alliance, the Discovery Institute, and the Pacific Science Center and past president of Intiman Theater in Seattle. He was co-chair of the capital campaign for the Computer Science and Engineering Department's building at the University of Washington and of ACES Northwest Network, a coalition of businesses supporting the implementation of autonomous, connected, electric and shared vehicles in the region. He served on the boards of TechNet Northwest, the Pacific Science Center, and Challenge Seattle. He was formerly a member of President Obama's National Advisory Council on Innovation and Entrepreneurship. He was also on the Investment Committee of the Seattle Foundation. He was also previously ranked number 12 of the 35 most influential

business leaders in the Seattle area by Puget Sound Business Journal.

Tom was an avid sailor, and he joined forces with celebrated winemaker Mike Januik to build the Novelty Hill Januik winery in nearby Woodinville, Washington. He was also one of the principal participants in the development of the Four Seasons Hotel in downtown Seattle. He and his wife, Judi Beck, also founded Oxbow Farm and Conservation Center.

Tom was a 1958 graduate of Ballard High School in Seattle, and he attended Harvard College, where he graduated cum laude. He received his law degree from Columbia Law School, where he was an editor of the "Columbia Law Review." Obituary c/o Madrona Venture Group. 

Ballard Art Collection's Ethnic Rainbow

Cince its founding in 1997 25 years ago, the Orre Nobles Art Collection of the Ballard High School Foundation has sought the best art possible to hang on the walls in the hallways and offices of the new building, designed by Mahlum Nordfors Architects and opened in 2000. The blue-ribbon judging panel, comprised of art world alumni and experts, was able to make sure artists of minority status were included from the beginning, its Washington State Arts Commission One-Half Percent legal allotment allowing us to acquire two works by nationally acclaimed African-American artists, Jacob Lawrence and his wife, Gwen Knight. His Windows and her Diva anchor the collection which has grown into a wonderful display of ethnic diversity, with artists representing many racial and ethnic groups.

The Lawrence holdings were supplemented with an extraordinary gift of prints of prominent Nigerian artists, given by Professor Emeritus Simon Ottenberg of the University of Washington. He is the author of the definitive book on contemporary Nigerian artists. Artists such as Michael O. Agwu (Igbo tribe) and Mike Tunde Togbe (Yoruba tribe) celebrate music and dance and are on view outside the Earl Kelly Performing Arts Center. In the music rehearsal room is a painting by a Greek-American alumnus, James Manolides, '57. His Piano (1964) is a perfect fit for the purpose of the room. Outside the band room are two other Lawrences, a pair of silkscreen posters, Runners (1971), specially commissioned for the 1972 Munich Olympics. Appropriately, they face the track and field trophy cabinet.

Reflecting the diversity of the student body and staff is one of four criteria for entering the Orre Nobles Art Collection. As a result, the school's historic origins for a ScandinavianAmerican enclave of commercial fishermen and carpenters are reflected in numerous artworks by area residents and alumni with roots in Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden. These include Art Hansen, '47; Einar Hansen; Steve Jensen, '74; Robert Maki; Alden Mason; John Moilanen; Frederick D. Olson, '52; Carol Pettersen, '62; Joan Stuart Ross; Matt Timo, '68; Sandi Johnsen Tomlinson, '62; and Brom Wikstrom.


Besides artists of Nordic heritage, other artists in the collection demonstrate how broadly diverse Ballard became, in addition to its Northern European roots. For example,

Dionne Haroutounian's *Armenian Diary* chronicles a visit to her ancestral homeland in Central Asia while the noted British artist Michael Lawson lived in Ballard in the 1960s after meeting Dale Chihuly in graduate school. The latter's family came from Czechoslovakia. His *Ikebana Diptych* painting was a gift of the artist whose studio and headquarters are in Ballard. Lawson's popular *Department Store* (1969) is on loan from a private collection. Another painting that mixes alarm and comedy, *High Tide* (2013) by Polish-born artist Ula Trudnos depicts Ballard neighborhoods submerged by the exigencies of climate change.

Professor Ottenberg's donation of Nigerian monotypes was joined by gifts of prints by Indigenous artists from the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, and Canada. These continued the Visual Arts Committee's current priority initiative, enriching the Collection's holdings of Native American art. Realizing sculpture

and tribal carvings were out of financial reach for the Committee's holdings of Native American art, Dr. Ottenberg offered five prints by celebrated Indigenous artists Randy Capoeman, Roger Fernandes, Shaun Peterson, Susan Point and Dylan Thomas.

This enormous act of philanthropy was enhanced by another generous gift, a carved cedar cabinet by John Hoover (Aleut). The donor, Greg Robinson, made the gift in memory of Visual Arts Committee member Steven Charles, '79, who instigated the acquisition initiative with his own donation of an artwork by Navajo artist Conrad House.

Although few Asian-Americans lived in Ballard in the early years, they are now represented in the student body. To reflect their interests in heritage, another alumnusdonor, Steve Clayton, '62, presented Cornered (1992), an unusual, all-white abstract painting by Frank Okada. Along with the other artworks mentioned above, Cornered bolsters the collection's examples of abstract art, the core of 20th century art and legacy that much of today's art builds on and renews. As the collection grows, it will continue to reflect the diversity of the students and staff as well as the changing ethnic make-up of the Ballard, Magnolia, and Queen Anne Hill areas. Gifts of art are complemented by cash donations that go directly to purchases, maintenance, and conservation.

Hallway Artwork: New Pieces and Old Favorites

Revisiting the Orre Nobles Collection 25 years after its creation


As students pass between classes, their heads are often turned down towards shuffling feet or towards each other, wrapped up in hallway conversations. Every now and then, though, heads turn up, away from the clutter of moving bodies.

In these moments, students might notice the vast array of paintings and art features, scattered throughout the corners of the school. Accompanied by small, shiny plaques,

these pieces make up the Orre Nobles Collection, an assortment of curated and eclectic pieces.

This collection was named after a former Ballard High School teacher who was known for his mentorship and creative influence on the community.

Though many are unfamiliar with this feature of the school, this collection is a unique and involved effort to showcase diverse art. In fact, Ballard is one of the only high schools in the country to house an art collection, with more than 75 pieces on display.

Despite its unusual existence, the news of the Orre Nobles Collection rarely reaches students.

"I did not know that there was a collection," senior Garrett Knight said. "I've seen a lot of the paintings around and I've always kind of wondered what the deal was with them."

Art Teacher Matthew Harkleroad seconds these thoughts, after interacting with students each year who have never heard of the collection.

"I get the sense that students aren't very aware of the art around them," Harkleroad said.

The collection is maintained and curated by the Ballard High School Arts Foundation, which is led by Matthew Kangas, a professional art critic and Ballard alum.


"I don't know of any other public schools in the country that have a collection like this," Kangas said. "It's like a regular small museum."

Within this "museum," a variety of art is showcased in an attempt to meet the foundation's four goals for the collection. As a whole, these goals focus on exhibiting art that represents regional history and the school's diversity, often created by local or alumni artists.

"[The collection] should represent the given makeup of the student body and the staff," Kangas said.

Throughout the 25 years since the collection's creation, new pieces have been regularly added with these goals in mind. Recent additions have been no exception, and include pieces by African-American artists like Jacob Lawrence and Gwen Knight. Indigenous artists such as Randy Capoeman and Susan Point are also showcased, along with Nigerian artwork gifted by UW Anthropology Professor Simon Ottenberg.

"I call [the collection] the curriculum-free art history class," Kangas said, referring to the opportunities for students to learn from the varied pieces as they pass through the halls each day.

In addition to the Orre Nobles Collection, several murals adorn the school walls, adding to the array of hallway artwork. One mural was created in 2019 and resides outside the library, while another was added to the Activities Center last spring.

"[The murals] are a complement to the collection as a whole," Kangas said.

The Multicultural Club led the creation of the most recent mural, which was designed by BHS graduate Cameron Patel.

"Our goal with the mural was part of a larger project to make the Activities Center more overtly welcoming of multicultural students," Patel said over email. "We specifically wanted to highlight the contributions of activists and artists of color while also showcasing patterns from a variety of cultures.

The mural depicts various prominent figures, such as poet and activist Amanda Gorman, surrounded by a rainbow color scheme and bright background patterns. Many of these patterns were contributed by students or clubs, adding to the mural's goals for diverse representation.

"[PASIFIKA Club] submitted a Samoan pattern, [Ballard graduate Eden] Mulu sent me an Ethiopian pattern, and [junior Semai] Hagos sent me an Eritrean pattern," Patel said.

Leaders of both the Orre Nobles Collection and the Murals hope that their messages extend beyond the artwork itself.


"Ideally, it is a gateway for people to learn more ... I don't want this mural to be the only time people interact with these cultures and histories, I want it to be a jumping-off point," Patel said.

In the future, the array of hallway artwork will continue to grow and shift, as the collection is maintained and students make their creative marks on the building.

"I surely hope [that clubs continue adding artwork to the building], because it makes the school a more beautiful and vibrant space," Patel said.




