The Impact of a New, Life-Changing Scholarship



ollege-oriented Ballard seniors are presented with an opportunity of a lifetime. Scholarship funds graciously given by the late C. David Hughbanks, continue his legacy through generous contributions to the

Ballard community.

Hughbanks, a 1954 Ballard alumni, passed away on July 18, 2023, leaving behind his estate in the hands of the Ballard High School



Foundation. Located in Sunset Hill, the estate is valued at around \$5 million. all of which will be awarded between Ballard High School and the Seattle Public Schools Scholarship Trust, all in the form of scholarships.

"This could be a significant game changer for a student depending on what their post secondary considerations are," Principal Abby Hunt said. Working closely with the foundation and family members of Hughbanks, she provides valuable insight.

Graduating BHS seniors will have access to \$150 thousand yearly for the next 10 years with around 15 scholarships available per graduating class. This is in addition to the \$40 thousand raised yearly from the Golden Beaver Scholarships. The exact number going to each student has yet to be determined.

"All of this is happening fairly quickly when you consider this much money," Hunt said.

Though all are welcome to apply, students in need of financial support are prioritized. Along with this, scholarships will only be allocated to seniors going onto secondary schooling within Washington State.

"He (Hughbanks) thought that there were so many opportunities and resources close to home that he wanted folks to stay and continue to contribute to the Ballard community," Hunt said.

Hughbanks was one of the co-founders of the Ballard High School Foundation, along with Dick Lee, his close friend and current executive director of the Foundation, and former BHS principal Chuck Chinn.

"He wanted to make sure that funds would go to young people who were needing some support," Lee said.

Lee shares yet another impactful goal for the scholarship money.

"One thing we're going to try and do with these scholarships is to not just have one time grants. but to be able to follow someone through their college experience," Lee said.

Since so many scholarships only cover first year's costs, this is a great advantage for seniors and their college expenses further down the road.

"We want the ability to give 10 scholarships, if possible, for young people that want to go onto more vocational or tech ed career paths," Lee said.

When asked about his personal reaction towards his friend's significant donation, Lee reports being overwhelmed, but not quite surprised.

Thank you, Mason '68 & Linda Williams '67

ongtime Ballard High School Foundation supporters Mason Williams '68 and Linda (Varon) Williams '67 first met in science class.

"Well, we had a chemistry class together," Mason said. "So, I knew Linda. We never did anything except say 'Hello,' but that was about it."

It finally took a sunny Golden Gardens meetup in May of 1967 to find their chemistry.

"One late afternoon, we kind of met through a mutual friend and then we started dating about a week later," he said. Five years later, the couple were married in 1972.

The Williams were kind enough to share some of their sunshine time from their home in Palm Desert, CA, and why they've been so generous with their support of Ballard High School Foundation.

Mason has fond memories of Ballard High School, taking a lot of science and math classes, and playing football for three years and baseball for one year. While high schools didn't have competitive athletics options for young women before Title IX, Linda grew up a skier.

"I still ski a little bit with my grandkids," she said. "So that's pretty exciting."

Linda's older sister, Carolyn (Varon) Fletcher '63, went to Ballard. Mason's older brother. Tom Williams '65. also attended Ballard and had a long career as a Seattle Public Schools teacher at Franklin and Roosevelt High School. He even taught at Ballard for a couple of years. Mason's Uncle Ralph also graduated from Ballard in 1926. While in high school, Mason recalled working many jobs. As a sophomore, he started working part-time on the Ship Canal, at the same fuel dock he would one day own.

THE SUMMER before Mason started his second year at the UW, he picked up even more hours on the fuel dock. With fall quarter fast approaching, Mason found himself facing an opportunity and a big decision.

"My employer, Mitch Covich, got sick and asked me to drop out for a quarter, which I did. He did survive his illness. barely. And he did come back. And at that time, it was marginal. There wasn't a lot of commercial business back then, to keep somebody employed.

"Mitch's strength wasn't quite as much after being in a hospital for a lengthy time, so he asked me to stay on, and I did," Mason said.

Partnering with Mitch's son, Gary Covich, Mason purchased the fuel dock in January 1975 and Covich-Williams Inc. was born. Two years later, when Gary decided he'd rather make a career in fishing, Mason bought him out.

This was a busy time for the Williams family, with their daughter Shelly born in December 1974. Robert "Bob" followed two years later in December

And from developing those roots, both as a family and longtime area business owner, Ballard has changed a lot over the years!

"I know, but I'm still there," Mason said. And the fuel dock is still serving the maritime industry -- vessels up to 400 feet -- although now they are also providing fuel for trucking operations too.

Their son, Bob, is now taking over the fuel dock, so Linda and Mason can take time off and enjoy their places in Palm Desert and Lake Chelan. They enjoy meeting up with their children. Daughter Shelly and her husband Andy visit their Lake Chelan place from California, as do Bob and

You'll also see Mason and Linda in August, raising their paddles at the Salmon Dinner, and with a cool beverage at Newcastle at the Victor Salvino 24th Annual Golf Classic.

Linda likes to play in the Foundation's annual Golf Classic. She scored a hole in one during the tournament's early years at Echo Falls (although sadly it wasn't on a prize hole).

They've been such long-time supporters, Mason couldn't recall precisely when they came to be involved with the Ballard High School Foundation. He said it likely was through Linda, and her longtime friends from high school, that drew them to participate in alumni events and fundraising efforts.

High School at the same time." he said. Mason said he remembers a fundraiser, that Dick Lee '61 and Camden Hall '58 became involved in.

"Somehow, somebody brought in Victor (Salvino '51) and Victor just stepped it up a notch or two or three, or 10," he

said of Salvino, a Ballard High School Wall of Recognition member, long-time Foundation supporter, and Golf Classic co-founder and recent host.

Ballard's maritime and hard-working fishing industry are in Mason's blood.

"I grew up in Ballard, the fishing industry is part of my life. We still own a couple of fishing vessels and I went to Ballard High School, James Monroe, Webster Grade School," he said.

So, it made sense to give something back to the school through their Foundation donations.

Mason also said he was inspired by Camden Hall '58, another Wall of Recognition member, who served as the Foundation President from 1998-2001. An attorney, "Cam" was there with helpful legal expertise in the Foundation's early stages, along with co-founders Dick Lee '61, Chuck Chinn, and C. David Hughbanks '54.

"That's when we got involved a little more, financially speaking, through our company and personally," Mason said.

When their kids were at Ballard High School (Shelly graduated in 1993 and Bob in 1995), Mason noticed that many of the upperclassmen he once admired as a teen, also coming together to the high school as parent volunteers.

> "You had. Art Olsen. Class of 63. Dick Lee. Class of 61 ... " Mason listed. "Gary Seefried ('64). Victor pulled him in, and Steve Olsen, Class of 62. A lot of the upperclassmen. Most of these guys were athletes and so I knew them all, just from watching them play football, basketball, whatever."

Their support helps their alma mater stay on the map and ensures an excellent high school experience for current and future Beavers.

"We love helping where we can," Mason said. "That's about the bottom line. I mean, we went there. Our kids went there. Our siblings went there. That's where we met."

Mason pointed to new helmets for football players, so they don't get concussions, and new uniforms for building Beaver Marching Band pride.

"Oh, it's a great marching band," he enthused. "We go to the Ballard parade, and here comes Ballard High School. Those things have all kind of waned away from us for a lot of years," he said, reflecting on the school support after he graduated. "You know, there just wasn't the money for instruments and band uniforms, and so the kids just went other directions."

"It's important to us to help the school because they get funds to do things that the Seattle School District won't do, or can't do, because of limited funds.

"So, it puts Ballard High School you know, up and above all the other schools in the in the area. And that's really important," Mason said.

Jerry Darby '55, a cherished husband, father, grandfather, great grandfather and friend, passed away peacefully on April 21, 2024, surrounded by his loving family.



Gunbjørg is survived by her daughter, Cecelia Sandvik (Jim Hodgson), grandchildren Katja and Artome, sister Solfrid Ladstein, plus close relatives in Norway and many friends with whom she loved to play pinochle, attend plays and vacation in Mexico. Gunbjørg loved to travel -- especially back to Norway -- and spend weekends at the family cabin on Lake Whatcom.

Louis Valentine Larsen '42 passed away on March 27, 2024 in Everett at the age of 99. Louis was born September 23, 1924 in Seattle to

Danish immigrant parents.

In high school Louis focused on his love of art. He was a student of the legendary



Orre Nobles at Ballard High School. As one of three art editors for the high school annual, "Ballard Shingle", they earned 1st place in a National Competition for their work.

Louis met his wife Dolores at a Norwegian Independence Day dance and were married on May 2, 1948, for 75 years! They had three sons, five grandchildren, and one great granddaughter.

Louis had quite a resume. He started out working in the local grocery store, building a strong work ethic. During World War II he went to work at Pier 91 in the Navy store's depot warehouse, followed by 13 years with AAA. During his last year he moved the family to Omaha, Nebraska. That was

a drastic change and he was drawn back home to the Northwest.

He landed a job with the 1962 Seattle World's Fair as Assistant Director of Exhibit Sales and Director of Special Events. During this period he rubbed elbows with and escorted many dignitaries which included the likes of John Glenn, Nat King Cole, Elvis Presley, Sen. Hubert Humphrey, Billy Graham, Prince Phillip - the Duke of Edinburgh, Attorney General Robert Kennedy and one of his favorites, Rafer Johnson, the 1960 Olympic gold medalist in the decathlon.

He worked at the Seattle Center as Director of Marketing and Promotion

in the 60's and early 70's. In December of 1967 representing the Seattle Center. he was part of a Seattle delegation that went to New York to present and bid for the 1976 Winter Olympic Games. Next was a position at the 1974 Spokane World's Fair. After that he was hired as Executive Vice-President for

Northwest Marine Trade Association.

He was an artist and craftsman. His passion was carving and NW Coast art. He carved a number of totem poles and sold many Indian boxes with silk screened formline designs. Nine of his totems were placed on the outside of the Franklin Building in Sitka, Alaska.

Many who knew Louis would attest to his "gift of gab." It seemed wherever he went he always knew someone. It truly was a "small world for him".

Louis is survived by: his wife Dolores, sons Stephen, Peter and Danny, five grandchildren, and a great grandchild.

Herbert V. Johnson '53 passed away March 16, 2024 at 88 years of age. Herb Johnson graduated from Ballard

High School in 1953, and is honored on the school's Wall of Recognition. He entered the U.S. Army, serving in Germany with the 1st Infantry



for three years. After finishing the University of Washington, he traveled to Paris, majoring in French studies at

the University of Paris.

After working two years for the federal government in Washington, D.C, he returned to Ballard High School, teaching French from 1962 to 1964. He was regarded as a demanding but fair teacher.

In 1964 he joined the police department and graduated near the top of his academy class. During his 30

years in police work, he had risen through the ranks from patrol officer to sergeant, lieutenant, captain, major and finally Assistant Chief and Chief of Detectives. He had been retired for seven years when Mayor Paul Schell asked him to come out of retirement in February 2000 and become the Interim Chief of Police.





Celebrating a Decade of G.A.I.N.S. Outreach

raduation Assistance Impacting the Needs of Students. Beyond an acronym, G.A.I.N.S. has been changing lives since it was first proposed in 2010 by past Ballard High School Principal Keven Wynkoop '94.

For more than a decade, G.A.I.N.S. Success Coordinators have worked to engage students and point them on the right path toward high school success and ultimately, graduation. And it all started with a meeting between Wynkoop and Foundation Executive Director and Co-Founder Dick Lee '61.

"He asked me the kind of question that every principal dreams of hearing," Wynkoop recalled. "If you could do anything at Ballard, what would you want to focus on?"



Wynkoop had read an article in the Seattle Times about the "incredible, comprehensive efforts" to raise graduation rates in the Everett School District over the previous seven years. One key strategy was to hire a Graduation Success Coordinator to work with students at each of their high schools.

"This resonated with me, because even if Ballard's (graduation) rate was higher than Everett's, every student that doesn't graduate has greatly reduced their future outcomes," he said.

In 2012, Ballard High School had an 89 percent four-year graduation rate, meaning that at any given time, nearly 200 students were at risk of dropping out or falling behind. Wynkoop shared that concern with Lee.

"I didn't want to be satisfied having the highest, or close to the highest, graduation rate in the district, because it still meant that students were leaving Ballard with a much steeper hill to climb in life," he said.

THE FOUNDATION stepped beyond their previous support of investing in capital items, such as the school greenhouse, library books, and uniforms, and developed a partnership with Ballard High School, to launch

the program. Lee reached out to Foundation Vice President Gretchen Scheumann '53, who had led

successful campaigns to raise money for the BHS Library. Former Foundation Board Member John Backes also brought his insight

to the team, having worked in the high school completion program at Shoreline Community College.

Seattle Public Schools were amid budget cuts, so the team decided to partner with (then Director) Mark Hendricks at the Ballard Boys and Girls Club. The club wanted to increase their connection with teens, Wynkoop said, so he was willing to enter a partnership where the BHS Foundation would raise the money and give it to the Boys and Girls Club to hire the first Success Coordinator, who would then work at Ballard High School.

Joey Thomas was hired as the first G.A.I.N.S. coordinator. And the results were felt almost immediately. After five years of the program, Ballard's four-year graduation rate had risen to 94 percent.

"G.A.I.N.S. has become a cornerstone for our work as a Foundation," Lee said. Through the intercession of G.A.I.N.S. Success Coordinators, the program aims to help students who are most at risk by providing the support and motivation to help these students

graduate on time and prepare for success in college and career. (See sidebar for more information.)

Part of the philosophy of the G.A.I.N.S. Program is that students in the program cannot be served by a system or a one-size fits all approach. Their needs and obstacles are unique to that student, so the school created a menu of interventions that could be utilized, Wynkoop said.

"The starting point for the G.A.I.N.S. Coordinators has always been to build a strong, trusting relationship with the students. While that relationship was growing, close monitoring of their grades was a fundamental building block to understanding their needs," he said. The students were also offered field trips to area two- and four-year schools to see what opportunities might be available to them one day.

"G.A.I.N.S. is a long-term investment in young people. They are not going to magically turn things around right away and some will actively resist our efforts, but they are all worth the investment," he said.

G.A.I.N.S. Still Going Strong

Since starting as Principal in fall 2022, Abby Hunt worked with the Student Intervention Team, and the G.A.I.N.S. coordinators, to reshape the program's delivery into a tiered approach to help students stay engaged in their class work. COVID and a significant human resources transition brought numerous challenges.


Meet the '23-24 G.A.I.N.S. Coordinators

Ballard's G.A.I.N.S. Success Coordinators (top to bottom) Ross Humphries '03, Dale Griffith and Malik Prince '11 work with Ballard High School administrators, counselors, and teachers to:

- · Identify incoming freshmen and existing Ballard students who are at risk for delayed graduation or dropping out due to grades, absenteeism, or disciplinary issues. Refer these students to existing resources for tutoring, credit retrieval, or social services support.
- · Mentor these students to provide individualized support, as well as ongoing monitoring of grades, attendance, and behavior.
- Improve the self-esteem of struggling students to support their efforts to better their academic careers.
- Acknowledge students' success at improving their grades, attendance, behavior, and progress toward graduation.







The three G.A.I.N.S. coordinators are also active outside of the school day as coaches for Ballard athletics. Note: We wish longtime Football Coach Ross Humphries well as he moved onto an exciting new opportunity at Interagency Academy this spring and thank him for his work on behalf of Ballard students. Dale Griffith and Malik Prince, continue as G.A.I.N.S coordinators, as well as softball and football coaches, respectively.

"We get to build authentic relationships with so many students." the coordinators said via email of their work in the classroom and in the sporting arena.

"Many times, those relationships lead to more credibility or trust when starting to work with new students because we may already have a positive relationship with a friend of theirs. The G.A.I.N.S. program at its foundation is a relationship-based mentorship program that is at Ballard to support students in multiple avenues as they navigate high school."

G.A.I.N.S. Program Works

Sharing their most recent data in May, the G.A.I.N.S. team had 53 students on their caseload. In the last few years, through a tiered system of support, G.A.I.N.S. coordinators have worked to get students back on track and off their caseload so they can assist a different student who has been identified as struggling. This school year, they exited 27 students from their caseload. All their students are expected to graduate and/or be placed in a more appropriate setting (such as an alternative school, Running Start, or a GED Program). The program remains successful in finding a best outcome for all the students it has served.

"Those two variables are noteworthy for those students who struggle most when structures fall apart. It was hard for everyone," she said. "These were incredibly caring, amazing people doing an important job, coming back from remote learning."

Hunt said she noticed great interactions

happening between the G.A.I.N.S. coordinators and the students, but also that the students were often lingering in the office, rather than in their specific classrooms.



She said while the social-emotional piece was important, she and the team also needed to evaluate the academic, graduation outcome, attendance, and qualitative data around the program.

"We were looking at G.A.I.N.S., rather than a fulltime support, but as an intervention, where they were working with a student who had a need and helping them work out of it," she said. "Our job is help equip students with the social and academic skills to do it on their own."

Students who have identifiable needs are evaluated by the School Counselors, Administrators, Social Worker, and Nurse to determine if a G.A.I.N.S. intervention is a right fit. It's a structured referral based on academic, attendance and teacher qualitative recommendation, she said. Some needs are met in other offices on campus, be it with Social Worker Mackenzie Fee, or interventions with the Ballard Teen Health Center's specialized staff.

This year, G.A.I.N.S. Success Coordinators Dale Griffith, Ross Humphries '03, and Malik Prince '11 also serve as 504 Building Coordinators. A 504 plan is a legal document created to ensure that students with disabilities receive appropriate accommodation and support in school. The plan outlines specific accommodations and services needed to provide the student with equal access to education. Coordinating 504s has allowed the G.A.I.N.S. team to support a larger group of students and identify potential G.A.I.N.S. students who may have fallen through the cracks in our school system.

G.A.I.N.S. coordinators are encouraged to walk the hallways, looking for students to engage with, Principal Hunt said.

"It is not uncommon for the students who would benefit from G.A.I.N.S. supports to be in the halls. So we need to find them where they are and be

present in the halls to connect with them." she said.

A tiered service approach allows for more of a connection and increased check-ins with the G.A.I.N.S. coordinators and at-risk students.

"So, we're strategic in how we use our time and resources," she said.

For more than 10 years, the G.A.I.N.S. team have served a crucial role in engaging and inspiring students to be engaged in their high school community.

"We're working to support all students, because if a Ballard High School student is not feeling a sense of belonging and engagement, that breaks my heart," Hunt said.





Link Crew Peer Leaders Welcome New Freshmen

ink Crew is a school volunteer program that supports students entering high school. Current sophomores and juniors can sign up to be Link Leaders, upperclassmen who welcome and connect with the freshmen, mentoring them throughout the year and making the adjustment to high school less daunting.

"Link Crew is meant to be a way for

(upperclassmen) to help ninth graders with the transition to high school," Laura Lehni, language arts teacher, ASB advisor and Link coordinator. said. "To help them find

a smaller group of folks that they can be with on the first day. To help answer questions and get some of those initial high school (fears) out of the way."

According to Piper Obenauer, junior and Link Leader, Link groups consist of two leaders and about 10 freshmen. Link Leaders greet the freshmen on the first day, give them tours of the building, check in with them throughout

the year and are a resource to ask questions and get information about events.

Link Crew creates a support system for new ninth graders, who may not know many people when going into high school. It also teaches them the ropes and helps to guide them through the new experiences that they'll have.

"We see Link Crew as this cool thing that can help students find connections," Lehni said.

While the main focus is helping freshmen, Link Crew can also bring together upperclassmen, allowing them to find like-minded people who are also eager to help.

commissioner, said. "Possibly some of your closest friends or even the closest mentors you might have."

According to Lehni, Link Crew has plans to expand beyond the first day of school for next year. There

will hopefully be monthly hangouts during lunch time for Leaders to have snacks and connect with their freshmen groups. Link coordinators are discussing bringing the groups together before large school events such as Homecoming and Winter Spirit Week.

While current Link Leaders have received over 30 service hours for being part of the Crew, increasing the amount of commitment next year will likely also cause that to increase.

"You get a lot of service hours," Lehni said. "It's a volunteer-based organization [and] it's a lot of time, but that recognition of your time is super important to us."

Link Crew is continuously adapting each year to make the transition to high school as smooth as possible for incoming freshmen. According to Luke Lysene, junior and current Link Leader, knowing someone who's been at high school for a while and knows how things work can be useful and make it less overwhelming.

"If you didn't have a good experience (entering high school), then you know you can try to help make the experience better for people," Lysene said. "If you did have a good experience, then you can help others feel the same."

MLK Week Celebrates Black Excellence

Martin Luther King Jr. is one of the most influential people in history. Many know him from his infamous "I Have a Dream Speech", letters from a Birmingham jail and his leadership in the Montgomery bus boycott.

However, the week of January 8-12, the Black Student Union's (BSU) involvement within the planning of a school-wide PowerPoint presentation and assembly provided a deeper dive into things people may not know about MLK.

Monday featured a PowerPoint presentation on MLK's background and included the surprising fun fact that he attended college at 15 years old. His speech "The Power of Love" was then played in each class.

BSU President Semai Hagos felt this speech would be a strong way to begin the week.

"I chose this speech because it's a speech not many people know, I thought it really showed his character and how he led with compassion," Hagos said.

The theme of leading with compassion carried on throughout the week. On Tuesday, PowerPoint slides were presented which discussed landmark Supreme Court cases and the impacts of the civil rights movement.

"We wanted to show the big events during the Civil Rights movement that drove MLK to want a change for not only African Americans but all minority groups," Hagos said.

To break up the week, Wednesday, students got the time to write down and reflect on what they had been learning.

"This time allowed for students to connect MLK's message to their lives and reflect on how his achievements impact our school and community on a daily basis," Hagos said.

On Thursday, BSU organizers wanted to prepare students for the Friday assembly by playing "Life's Blueprint," a speech in which MLK addressed high schoolers.

"This speech is relevant and engaging for students, allowing them to connect MLK's aspiration to our school and community," Hagos said. "He motivates us to dream big and to strive to be the best in whatever it is we become in life."

To wrap up the whole week, BSU hosted the MLK Assembly where they arranged for the choir and orchestra to sing "Lift Every

Voice and Sing." The Washington Diamonds Drill Team also performed.

"We spoke with the drill team on how funk styles such as this one originated from West African tribal dances, which made its way to America," Hagos said. "During the Civil Rights Movement, hymns and dances became a way for slaves to comfort each other and as a form of protest."

The drill team's captivating performance is one that BSU Advisor Malik Prince '11 grew up with.

"At my old high school we used to have drill teams come to school at least twice a year. Performances like these are much more frequent and brought the school together," Prince said.

After the drill team's performance, junior Shya Knox performed a self-written rap relating to MLK and his vision. Prince gave insight into how this rap was a way to communicate MLK's message.

"Personally for myself I feel like I connect more with things when they are communicated on a level that is artistic. I think students feel that way as well, that's why using hip hop and rap was really important for the assembly," Prince said.

Hagos hopes that performances like these in assemblies will help to bring the school and community together.

"I think we bond better over fun and interactive events such as dancing, rather than just reading PowerPoint slides," Hagos said. "The different performances seemed to have been engaging to the students."

Throughout the week students were educated in an interactive way to help teach MLK's main message: to bring people together and lead with love, always.
